In addition, one of their vendors, Snapper Rock gave Copper Cannon over 1,000 pieces of swimwear. Friday afternoons, youth had a chance to fill their new day packs with toiletries, school supplies and gently used clothing from our clothes closet.

Another summer is in the record books and another collection of wonderful stories. Even with the leaves turning, Copper Cannon's growth is continuing.

At times it can be difficult to see if we are making a difference in the lives of our campers. With a one week program, children come in and out of our lives every Sunday. Just as we are getting to know them, we say good bye and a new group arrives. But, we are in the life changing business and I experienced the rewards again this summer.

Our last week of camp is for teenagers aged 13 through15. This group of adolescence descend upon camp ready to experience life, test limits and boundaries, and are electronically connected to everything.

This summer was no different with fifteen boys and thirty-two girls registered for camp. Upon their arrival, staff had moments of anxiousness with seventy-five percent of the youth returning from previous summers. How would they respond to no cell phones or text messaging? To new staff? To a nine thirty lights out? To cleaning their cabins?

What transpired has renewed my optimism for the next generation and the importance of places like Copper Cannon Camp. Our teens were utterly amazing. They showed compassion, respect and empathy. They cared about each other and the program. There was support and encouragement without being asked. They even kept their cabins clean!

By Friday afternoon, I was on pins and needles as I waited for something to go wrong. These kids were amazing and I knew it could not last. But I was wrong. Our teen week and summer ended on a positive note with these youth showing an old time camp director, Copper Cannon has an amazing impact on people. I am looking forward to see a number of these great kids becoming future staff members.
