
It's never too early to start thinking about summer camp!

When it is time to start writing the next installment of the Powder Keg, it is always fun to take a look at the past. I wrote this in February of 2007 and it holds true today. Children who need camp do not care about the political climate or the economy. They want to experience the wonders of summer camp, the connections built with others and the fun.

As my second year anniversary at Copper Cannon rolls past I find it ironic. Moving from Tulsa, Oklahoma I expected snow, snow, snow. But by mid-January, Tulsa had received more snow than Copper Cannon.

With two years under my belt, I can no longer use the excuse that I am new. Of course, when working with kids, you are

always learning and seeing things you never expected. That is why I am looking forward to the summer of 2007! I would have never guessed someone could lick their own elbow or rotate their hand 360 degrees when the palm is flat on a table until last year.

My learning does not compare to the impact Copper Cannon has on kids. I did a presentation to campers from the Concord area at the Concord Elks in November. We had a dozen parents and their children from that area attend on a Friday evening. Within five minutes the kids were beaming with excitement trying to outdo each other with their stories and laughter as they reminisced. The best part was watching parents who were not at camp and could not understand the stories such as why everybody had to hop on one foot to get in to the dining hall or how a smore counts as three food groups (chocolate, sugar and more chocolate). But their faces showed appreciation: appreciation for others taking good care of their child and giving each child such a wonderful experience. My job is the easy part. I get to be the "funmiester" entertaining children and being the biggest kid of the bunch. All too often we forget about the donors and volunteers who help make camp happen. These individuals may not see the fruits of their labor, but they are present and growing. Thank you for your continued support of Copper Cannon Camp.



KATIE'S THANK-YOU PHILOSOPHY

I think about this question every time I send my nieces or nephews a gift. It appears society today does not believe in a thank you note. And hand written – No Way! If one does come, it is a text, email, or through an app.

None of these show you are thankful for my gift. Neither does a form letter. If an organization cannot take the time to write a heartfelt thank you note, why even bother? Giving a gift takes your time, consideration, and heart. And you deserve to be thanked for all you put into the gift.

That is the philosophy at Copper Cannon Camp. When you are kind and generous enough to donate a monetary or in-kind donation, you put time and consideration in what would be the best donation. I love writing the thank you notes for our donors. And I love to receive the notes back from them answering questions or letting me know what is going on in their lives. Thank you notes must come from the heart, not just the same words to every person. Maybe the thank you notes from Copper Cannon will help the younger generations understand the importance of time and attention to detail!





TEEN LEADERSHIP RETREATS



Copper Cannon continues its return of our Teen Leadership Retreats for those 13-16 year old campers. Over the course of the school year, Copper Cannon hosts 3 leadership retreats: October, February and May and if pre-COVID events are any indication, they will be well received.

The staff develops a unique and strong relationship with our teens and we can help them navigate adolescence a little easier. As a teen camper shared at our closing campfire this summer, "I appreciate everything this place has given me. It is not just the people. It is all part of the Copper Cannon experience.
